Composing an article such as this for the Rí Eolas is a sure sign that our school year is coming to an end and that planning for the next year should be underway. It prompts me to reflect on the year gone by and to look forward to the coming year.

A true highlight of the year was the fantastic visit to Coláiste Chríost Rí of Mr. Vincent Guérend, the French Ambassador. This visit was prompted by the success of our TY students and teachers who won the AIPLF Ireland competition with their French video entry promoting sport for the upcoming Olympic Games. Congratulations and many thanks to Ms. Déborah Aubert, Ms. Margaret Casey, the French department, TY students and all involved in this wonderful occasion.

This year saw a number of other positive developments. We have welcomed Br Theiva to the staff and chaplaincy team, seen the completion of our new home room, the redevelopment of the Sean Halla, the repurposing of the library into a support hub and the erection of new fences and gates at the front of the school. The provision of a new lunchtime food service has been warmly welcomed by the students. Recently, some members of our school leadership team also volunteered and participated in an EU-funded Erasmus Mobility Programme over Easter. This programme afforded us the chance to evaluate our own school practices, look at what other European schools offer in terms of curriculum and faith development, and identify areas for development within our schools. Central to this was also the development of connections between our network of PBST schools; a very worthwhile endeavour.

Next year will be equally busy. We will see the introduction of a free book rental scheme for all Junior Cycle students; the opening of our second special class, advancement of Senior Cycle Reform, progression of our LCA programme, installation of a new fire safety system, continued progress on our main extension and the refurbishment of our main entrance, offices, and lobby areas.

All these wonderful developments are enhancing our school and the experience of all members of our school community. A successful school is, however, so much more than buildings, furniture, and fittings. During my career as a teacher, I have always had a particular interest in the school timetable. I have been involved in producing timetables for many years, beginning even before the advent of timetabling software. To the outside observer, the school timetable is a very functional thing. It is just a list of classes, teachers and rooms, a sequence of places to be and times to be there.



I have, however, often thought of the timetable as the "pulse" of the school. The timetable provides the beat and the rhythm for each day and for each week. It outlines the school's curriculum, what is available to students and, crucially, how each student can access the curriculum. The timetable reflects the school's ethos, in a very practical way, as the school's ethos guides the decision-making process which shapes each year's timetable. The timetable is a quick and easily accessible indication of the wide range of subject choices available and their different levels; the support of students with additional education needs; how student wellbeing is at the core of timetable planning; whether it adapts to meet the changing needs of the students and the school and most importantly, how it is designed to assist students in achieving academic excellence and to help each student grow and develop fully as a person. The timetable is, without doubt, at the very centre of school life, and yet, without students and staff it is merely a functional, sterile thing. Whilst the timetable provides a framework for the school week, it is the people, and even more crucially the relationships between those people, that really determine just how fulfilling school life is.

In Coláiste Chríost Rí, our relationships are based on respect, and when an issue arises our restorative approach enables us to restore and mend any relationships that have been damaged or strained. A restorative approach does not result in poor discipline or lower standards. In fact, a restorative approach produces much better outcomes in the longer term, as

all members of the school community form much more effective, productive, and respectful relationships, based on a shared understanding of our values and of what the school is striving to achieve.

As is the case with every other school, we are continuously at the receiving end of departmental circulars and guidelines and, as a Catholic school, we are also directed by dogma and doctrine. All of these

are necessary and vitally important to the education of our students. However, in our school, as we seek to develop young men of character, ambition, and judgement, we need also to be very mindful of the heart of our school, our ethos, and our relationships.

On the 11th of January, of this year, Coláiste Chríost Rí lost a great friend of the school and its extended community.

Bernard Martin (Bernárd Ó Máirtín) was the school's first PE teacher at a time when PE, as a subject, was not on the national curriculum. (The Pres. Brothers were ahead of their time).

Bernard, who had a great love for the Irish language, was highly respected by students and teachers alike. He introduced weight training for the hurling and football teams at a time when few, if any, had even considered it. Many agree that during his time in the school, Bernard's input had a considerable influence on fitness levels and helped CCRí become one of the dominant forces in Gaelic football and hurling from the late 60's. His philosophy helped establish an ethos towards training and physical conditioning that carried the teams forward in the following decades.

After his time in Críost Rí Bernard worked in UCC, once again passing on his expert knowledge to all who sought it, many of whom were past pupils of his former workplace.

It was a predictable and fitting tribute to Bernard that so many attended his funeral. Past pupils, GAA stars, former colleagues and school principal, Pádraig Mac An Rí, were all present at St. Patrick's Church, Rochestown, on the 15th, to sympathise with Bernard's loving family and bid farewell to our much-respected former colleague, trainer and friend.

Mission Development Work

"Wealth is not always measured in money. We each have time, talent and creativity, all of which are powerful forces for positive change. Share your blessings in whatever form they come and to whatever level you have been blessed" - Mahatma Gandhi

Development work is always very challenging and for the most part positive and life-changing where it is done with the participation of the people both in its design and implementation. The era of the 'missionaries' going overseas is over and a new generation of local people with great talents and ideas has taken the reins and are steering the work in new directions with an emphasis on meeting the local needs and making the projects sustainable while empowering the beneficiaries to manage and control them for the future.

The Presentation Brothers have been working in Ghana and Nigeria, their West Africa Province – WAP, for almost 60 years. Initially they put all their energies into building schools, bringing education, skills and knowledge to the new generations of people. The old adage 'Education is the key to changing lives' certainly applied and so many of the entrepreneurs, leaders of business, politics and social change attribute their success and ability to forge new horizons for their countries to the education they received from the brothers in the schools they set up in remote rural areas.

The focus today is still mainly on education but with a view to changing society in new and different ways. Everybody knows that women are the backbone of society and the economy throughout Africa. They have been the hewers of wood and drawers of water since time immemorial with little recognition or appreciation of their efforts.



The focus now is to make sure that young girls are treated equally and given opportunities to get education and improve their life chances. Since 2019 the 'Girl Child Project' has been underway. The purpose here is to make sure that girls are sent to school from a young age and that they are encouraged to stay in school until a minimum of Junior High School Certificate JHSC (equivalent of Junior Cert) has been completed.



In remote rural areas there can be pressure on girls to leave school and marry at a young age, some as young as 15 years old. The Presentation Brothers working in collaboration with the Catholic Education Unit in the Navrongo/Bolgatanga district have pumped huge resources into this project which involves all the communities in the region. The elders in the locals communities, the local chiefs, head-teachers in schools and many different role models have been brought on board to make sure that whole communities are educated and made aware that girls must be sent to school and stay in school until they have reached the JHSC.

The budget for the project has been €60,000 per year and it is calculated that 7,000 girls per year have stayed in school as a result. This project involves setting up 'girl clubs' in each school so that they have support and encouragement at all times. Girls have been provided with bicycles to travel to school each day, school uniforms and school books and all the students in each school (boys and girls) are provided with a nutritious cooked meal each day. This feeding programme is vital to the success of all the students as it encourages attendance, takes the pressure off poor parents to provide food for their children and it aids concentration and learning.

The figures for the success of this project go far higher than the immediate 7,000 girls who are in school as it also helps the parents and siblings of the girls who benefit with new levels of learning, skill, confidence and achievement. The number of people who benefit 'indirectly' from this project is estimated to be close to 30,000 each year. The 'Girl Child project' and other similar initiatives raise the standards and ambitions of whole communities. As a result of the success of this project, communities are much more open and willing to take initiatives and start new enterprises and projects.

Rural Africa is where the effects of climate change are mostly sharply felt. Each year sees less and less rainfall, droughts and crop failures. To address this huge problem for communities, where subsistence farming is the only means of making a living for 90% of the people, 'Earth Clubs' have been set up to educate and train all the students in simple organic methods that protect the local environment and use new knowledge to make sure that farming continues to be a viable way of life and a source of food for the future.

The appetite for knowledge and new skills has grown hugely and to respond to the requests of the parents a 'Women's Organic Farming Project' has been set up beside one of the schools as a test run for rolling this out across all the communities where the Pres Bros work. It is a ground-breaking project as it required the local chiefs to hand over ownership of a parcel of land to the 'women's group'. Up to now women could not own land or property in their own right.



To overcome this obstacle the land is owned by the 'women's group' and not by any individual. In the last few weeks a borehole for water (30 metres deep) has been sunk, the land has been fenced in to prevent animals straying in and destroying the crops and the seeds for 10 different highly nutritious crops have been sown. It has brought energy and vitality with a huge boost of confidence for the future to this community. The total cost for this simple organic farming project, which benefits 250 women and their families, came to €15,000. These costs included the drilling of the borehole, building a pump house and installing the pump as well as the fencing and seeds required for the crops. All the hard digging and labour was provided free by the local women and men who have a pep in their step and are delighted to be taking control of their own lives and futures.

These are a few simple examples of the work in the 'Development Office', which is very rewarding and satisfying. I submit the proposals and reports to funding agencies to get the funds to get these projects off the ground. The people themselves do the real hard work to make them successful and sustainable.





Reunion of Corn Uí Mhuirí Winners of 1997 and 1998



Recently a group of players from both the '97 and '98 winning Corn Uí Mhuirí Squads gathered in the Briar Rose Bar and Restaurant on the Main Douglas Road. It was a really joyous occasion particularly seeing so many past pupils who brought great honour to the school. It was gratifying to see how well they have all done in life but yet still found the time to come back and spend some time with their former teammates and teachers. The school will be forever in their debt for the way in which they contributed to the history and tradition that is unique to Coláiste Chríost Rí.

The following is a brief summary of both campaigns.

On a bright August morning in 1996 three weeks before the end of the summer holidays, the CCRí Senior footballers assembled in Páirc Choilm for their first training session of the season. We had not won a Corn Uí Mhuirí for 8 years, an eternity for a school with our reputation. At the end of the session, it was obvious these players were determined to bring the cup back to CCRí for the 12th time and so end our barren spell.

The players trained really well during September and October and were well primed for our first-round game v Midleton CBS on October 24th. We emerged victorious on a scoreline of 3-16 to 2-5.

Our second-round game v St Colman's Fermoy proved to be a much tougher encounter. We were behind by a point at half time but an improved second half performance ensured victory by 8 points.

On March 2nd 1997 we played the semi – final v St Flannan's in Fenagh. It took a brilliant equalising point scored by our captain Fionán Murray 4 minutes and 48 secs into injury time to level the game and bring the tie to a replay. We won the replay by 5 points and set up a Final meeting with Kerry Kingpins St Brendans, Killarney. We were going for our 12th title, St Brendans their 9th. Our players put on a brilliant display of attacking football to emerge as champions on a scoreline of 2-12 to 0-6.

The '98 campaign had a different feel to it. We were going in as champions so opposing teams would

work much harder against us. We were ready for any challenge since we had prepared well. The opening game against the North Monastery was played in challenging underfoot conditions but we managed to win this dour encounter on a scoreline of 0-11 to 0-2.

Our second-round game v St Fachtnas of Skibbereen proved to be a really difficult encounter. With time almost up our captain William Cummins dropped a sideline ball into the square, the Skibb fullback dropped the ball and Cathal Mc Carthy goaled to bring us level. The Skibb goalkeeper kicked the ball out and with the referee about to blow for fulltime Barry Murphy pounced on the loose ball and kicked the winning point. We were so relieved to get this victory and move on to the next round.

We played Flannans in the semi-final and this time the players ensured there would be no replay. We won on a scoreline of 2-10 to 1-6 thereby setting up an all-Cork final v our sister school Coláiste an Spioraid Naoimh. The final was played in Pairc Uí Rinn. The players gave a very assured performance winning comfortably 3-13 to 3-3. We were champions again winning back-to-back titles which was a great achievement by the players.

GAA Update 2023/24

Coláiste Chríost Rí saw another busy and successful year in both Hurling and Football in 2023-24.

The under 14 footballers and hurlers qualified for the semi-final round for the second year in a row. The footballers pulled off wins against Coláiste Pobail Bheanntraí, Glanmire Community College, and a last-minute winning goal from Ryan Crean to beat Mount St. Michael Rosscarbery in a thrilling game.

Our hurlers had a great win against Carrigaline Community College to qualify to the semi-final; great performances by Caidan Morgan, Mattie O'Leary and Darragh Corcoran in the Críost Rí jersey. We hope they can replicate the double victory from last year again.

We started the year with the under 15 Munster B football championship, where we clashed with Pobalscoil Chorca Dhuibhne and came out victorious! Outstanding performances on the day from Morgan Kelleher and Morgan Corkery. Unfortunately, the lads were beaten by eventual winners, St. Michael's Listowel, in a back-and-forth game that could have gone either way. Very impressive performances from David Clarke O'Mahony and Alex O'Herlihy.

The under 15 hurling team competed in difficult conditions against a strong team from St. Caimin's Community College, Shannon. A great display of some very promising young hurlers on the day. Callum McCarthy-O'Donovan and Micheál Fleming-Forde stood out on the day.

The under 16 footballers pulled off a fantastic win against Boherbue Comprehensive School in Glenville.

Adam Quinlivan and Cathal O'Herlihy were central in this comeback win. They lost in the next round to a very strong Mitchelstown CBS team, with a lot to learn for this talented bunch. In hurling, the boys had two very good wins against St Colman's Community College and Carrigaline Community School, eventually losing in the semi-final to Coláiste Treasa Kanturk. A fantastic run was led by Kyle Cronin, Diarmuid O'Donovan and Ryan Deasy. A lot to come from this bunch in the next few years.

The under 17 hurlers played against a strong St. Anne's Killaloe side, while the footballers had a great win against Comeragh College followed by a loss to Gaelcholáiste Mhuire A.G. Big performances this year from Jack Shine, Evan Malone and Trevor Howe.

Our Senior football team had a busy year. Losing out to Hamilton High School in the Simcox cup, a game that was well in the melting pot until the 45th minute. In the Corn Uí Mhuirí, the boys played against Mercy Mounthawk, who reached the All-Ireland final, Pobalscoil Chorca Dhuibhne, a game that was very close to the 50th minute, and Coachford College.

In hurling, the boys came up short against St.

Mungret College and Ballincollig Community School.


There were big performances this year from James



Erasmus Mobility to Salerno

This Spring leadership representatives from all eight PBST schools and the Trust were afforded the opportunity to take part in an EU-funded and organised Erasmus Programme to Salerno, Italy.

The purpose of this trip was to explore faith-based education in a context different from our own, in an effort to gain new ideas and further develop connections between other PBST and EU schools. Increased integration and the building of staff connections across schools in the PBST network was also a very successful result of this Erasmus programme.





While the focus of our Erasmus was on the challenges and opportunities that face faith-based education, there was also scope to examine issues common to education across the globe such as inclusion, catering for pupils with additional needs, appreciating diversity, and the teaching of religion in a modern, increasingly secular, society.

It was reassuring to see that many best-practice education methodologies used in PBST schools are also in use across the EU. The dedication and passion of teachers in both countries was also clear to see. Although religious education is structured and taught very differently in both Irish and Italian contexts, faith development and engagement are a common goal. We look forward to future Erasmus programmes that offer development opportunities in this area.

Green Schools and Environmental News

Over the last two years, our focus has been on water conservation. With this initiative, we monitored water usage in the school to ensure there was as little wastage as possible. Previously, we had completed a lot of work in this area by installing new taps and fixing leaks, so our work was mainly aimed at ensuring that all was in order.

Last April, the Green Schools' Committee planted bee friendly flowers and shrubs on the hill of the school field. It is proving difficult to change the flora on this hillside as the consistently poor weather prevented us from following up on our earlier efforts. We knew at the outset that this project would take quite a bit of time and effort to complete and hopefully, after Easter, we can get stuck in and make some more progress.

We are also keeping up our work in waste management. In 2023 we applied successfully for a waste management grant and used the money to buy recycling bins for every room in the school. The message from our Green Schools Committee is that we must drastically cut down on our use of plastic. The committee encourages everyone in the school community to use the recycling bins properly as this will reduce the amount of waste that ends up in landfill.

Every October the Committee gathers up the leaves in the yard which are then added to our compost heap, located near the polytunnel. In November 2023, we also took part in the GLOBE Air Quality Survey organised by An Taisce. The purpose was to monitor traffic related air-pollution at schools, at the front and back of the building and compare both. The tubes were left in place for four weeks and the samples were then sent off to be analysed and our results were added to a national database.

Recently we had our Green Flag inspection by Cork City Council. This went very well and we are expecting a favourable response from the organisers. The Green Schools Committee members deserve great praise for all the work they put in every year. There is not enough space to mention them all individually, but their efforts are greatly appreciated and will be celebrated later in the year.

At the time of writing, the UN weather agency has just issued 'red alert' about global warming. This announcement should dominate news all over the world and yet, when I asked students about this, only a couple of them had heard the warning. Over the last twenty years or more we have seen a change in our weather patterns. In that same period, we have experienced more storms, hurricanes and floods than ever before. It is now critical that we heed this alert and do everything in our power to ensure that we pass on a clean and habitable world for future generations.








































Meitheal 2023-24
